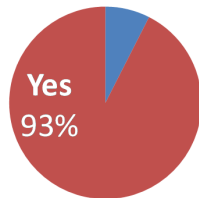

THE ARIZONA REPUBLIC features MWC and PWC in feature on State Jobless Rate of 9.2% — The August 21

edition of *The Arizona Republic* quotes LWIB area directors:

"The three Phoenix Workforce Connection Centers, also known as one-stop career centers, saw the number of unemployed people seeking help more than double in the fiscal year that ended June 30, to 186,000 from 90,000 in the previous year, said Stan Flowers, the workforce-development supervisor. One center near 51st Avenue and Osborn Road is especially swamped, he said. "Lines form before the building opens," Flowers said. "There are 35 to 40 people in line when it opens at 8 a.m."

Maricopa County Workforce Connections centers have been equally as busy. The centers have been getting more than 10,000 job seekers a month, and recently, the number hit 14,000, Assistant Director Patrick Burkhart said. Job seekers are flocking to courses that help them write better resumes, handle interviews better and pick up other skills."

Local Workforce Investment Areas Take Regional Approach to Secure ARRA Grants — Over 40 agencies provide workforce development services in Maricopa County. Given the prospects for an extended economic slowdown, coupled with restricted financial resources and a steadily growing demand for services, the workforce development community in Maricopa County recognizes the urgent need for greater collaboration and streamlining of services as the best and most effective response to the region's needs.

The Maricopa Human Capital Collaborative (MHCC), a new and highly networked coalition of regional workforce development services providers was established by a leadership team composed of agency directors from the Phoenix Workforce Connection, the Maricopa Workforce Connections, Arizona Women's Education and Employment, Inc., Arizona Call-A-Teen Youth Resources Inc., Friendly House, Chicanos por la Causa, Inc. and The Arizona Opportunities Industrialization Center.

The Collaborative will function seamlessly to help restore the region's economic stability in the short term, and its economic competitiveness in the long term. The MHCC will function as an open referral network so that job seekers can obtain the assistive services they need quickly and effectively.

A major focus of the Collaborative is to coordinate the pursuit of additional funding opportunities, primarily federal grants that can be secured to enhance the region's capability to enhance and expand the services available to both job seekers and employers. Arizona Women's Education and Employment, Inc., (AWEE) has taken the lead in competing for a Pathways Out of Poverty grant to assist in developing a green workforce in an underserved area in south Phoenix. Members of the Collaborative support them in this effort.

Recap of Jobing.com's August Career Expo — The August 12th event offered more than just employer booths. One corner of the University of Phoenix Stadium offered workshops focused on topics like what

industries are hot in today's economy, and how to stand out from your competition. There were employer hosted workshops. Eight local employers had their own private workshop section where they offered a variety of in-depth information about their organization, their hiring practices, how to more effectively use social media in a job search, etc. The event's largest partner, Maricopa Workforce Connections offered Interviewing and Resume Instruction workshops from 10am-1:30 pm to help veterans and dislocated workers improve their resumes and interviewing skills. The workforce professionals at MWC provided intensive resume reviews for workshop participants and others and provided a computer lab so the updates could be made prior to the beginning of the Expo and throughout the day.
