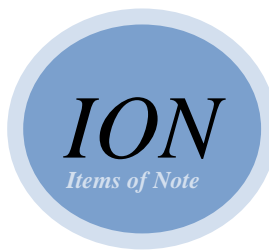

ARRA Summer Youth Employment Program — The Summer Youth Employment Program is in full swing. As of May 1, 2009, MWC and PWC:

- Received more than 3,200 youth applications
Confirmed 563 worksites representing 1,226 employment positions

This is a wonderful response from our community to offer participating youth the opportunity to learn new work skills. Prior to the work experience, youth participants will be enrolled in a week-long Work Readiness class in which they will learn about career/ labor market trends, interviewing skills, resume development, team building, and budgeting basics.

PWC's Summer Youth Career Exploration/Internship Program — In addition to coordinating a Summer Youth Employment Program, Phoenix Workforce Connections, coordinates a Summer Youth Career Exploration and Internship program.

The Exploration program focuses on healthcare, robotics and entrepreneurial areas. This year PWC received 160 youth applications. Eligible participants will be matched with 90 available

internships at 65 different worksites.

PARTNER ITEMS

Workforce Partnership Trains Over 200 Healthcare Workers — Through a unique partnership with Phoenix Workforce Connection and Maricopa Workforce Connections, businesses and educators recently joined forces to train more than 200 healthcare workers. Federal workforce development funds, provided training scholarships for certified nurse assistant, medical assistant, patient care technician, pharmacy technician, and licensed practical nurse positions. The students ranged from entry level hospital and community clinic workers aspiring to higher skilled positions and salaries, middle-aged laid-off workers seeking more stable careers, and low-income youth entering the workforce.

This program was based on funding short-term occupational training to help individuals re-enter the workforce quickly and on a solid career path in a growing industry. With an aging population, anticipated to require record levels of care, and the existing shortage of skilled healthcare workers, the healthcare field promises employment well into the next 10 to 20 years.

Through the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA), the city of Phoenix and Maricopa County were awarded \$16 million for job training programs in high demand and emerging industries. This ensures that the successful program models will continue to be offered to the community in the near term. Directives at the national level encourage use of ARRA funds for training and employment programs in healthcare and green industries and Arizona is stepping up to build a strong, educated and talented workforce that will benefit our community for generations to come. Not a Typical Jobing.com Job Fair — The May 6, 2009 Jobing.com Job Fair offered more than employment opportunities to local job seekers. The ever popular Resume Review services provided in part by MWC workforce development staff was again a highlight for the event. This event included a Community Career Services Pavilion where a half-a-dozen workforce partners educated job seekers about the additional services available to them such as GED and computer classes, instructions for signing up for Unemployment Insurance, veteran specific services, utility assistance and other supportive services. Participants in this area included Goodwill, AWEE, Las Artes de Maricopa, DES, ACYR, PWC and MWC.

The on-site workshops featured: "Networking - Are you Leveraging it to your Career Advantage" by Lisa Schumacher from Right Management and "Stay Positive In a Negative World - How to Laugh in the Face of a Challenging Economy!" by Dave Sherman, Professional Speaker, Trainer, and Best-Selling Author. There was also an open forum where a panel of local experts answered a wide-variety of job seeker questions. The HR Professionals on the panel were from Casino Arizona, Vangent and the East Valley HR Association. Maricopa Workforce Connections also served on the panel and moderated the session.

Event coordinators promoted the event as a tool to learn more about companies, their available opportunities and how best to be positioned to be called for an interview. Yes, many employers require job seekers to apply online; however, there are specific requirements for each such as the use of key words, job titles and descriptions and the companies philosophies and culture.
